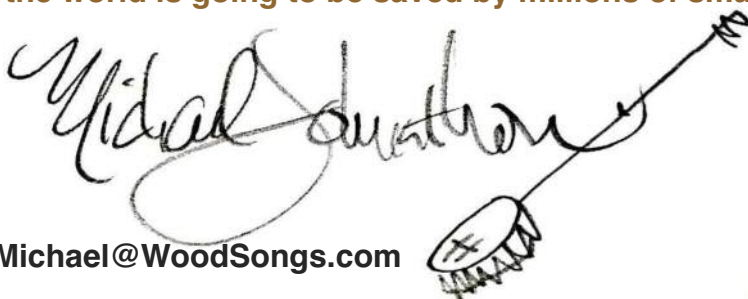
You may not be a highly paid architect creating skyscrapers igniting the horizon of major cities, but you've built your children a playground with your own two hands. It makes your children happy.
